ECC Report Mid-January 2014

Proposed Budget 2014/15

Cabinet will be looking to agree a rise in Council Tax of 1.49% at its meeting next Tuesday 21st January; this will be the first increase in 4 years which will mean an extra £16 per year on a typical band D property; the extra revenue generated by this will be spent on apprentice-ship schemes, youth funding and vulnerable people.

The Council has still to find £285 million between now and 2016 because of central government grant funding cuts; the proposed budget savings will bring about a £50 million reduction from the £285M shortfall.

The Community Initiative funding will remain at the same level as last year's and an extra £12million will be put in Highways.

The Adult Social Care budget in 2014/15 has been increased by £6.5m to £378m from £371.5m in 2013/14.

The capital programme has been increased to £223 million of which £90 million will be spent on infrastructure to help build our economy as well as provide improved road schemes for our residents.

Extra funding for schools

The Department of Education has released details on various funding streams for local authorities; ECC share is around £114million. £3m will go to improve and refurbish primary school kitchens around the county so that they can all be able to offer hot meals to their pupils. £15m will go to boost funding for early year learning for two year olds from lower income families, but most significantly £96m, the second highest allocation in the country, will be spent on increasing school places which reflects the growing pressure that exists in the education sector.

Community Computing Scheme

ECC has donated over 700 computer system worth £34.000 to charities and community voluntary groups across the county. Dozens of desktops and laptops have been given to various organizations for free which shows the support for the work they do in their community. This

on-going scheme was created alongside the Information Services Modernisation Programme which during its evolution, it decreased the number of computers needed for the business demands thus creating a surplus; these devices are completely cleared of data and then loaded with charity licenced software and then ready for its alternative use and it must be stated that this has no cost to the council as all the data export and re-load is done in house. Second Hand Car Dealing

Complaints about second hand car dealers in Essex have reduced dramatically thanks to a new initiative run by the council's Trading Standards team; the project targets the most complained about car dealers in Essex and helps them to raise their standards for the benefit of consumers. Trading Standards officers do this by working closely with the dealers to ensure they understand the consequences of unacceptable level of complaints. The team gives them advice, guidance and reviews their procedures.

The project has seen a 43 per cent decrease in complaints regarding the most complained about dealers. Those who do not follow Trading Standards advice and guidance will be subject to enforcement.

Essex CC Energy Switch

In line with this morning early breakfast news ECC has launched a new scheme for residents to get cheaper energy; registration is now open for the Essex Energy Switch - a new community scheme which aims to get Essex residents a better deal on their gas and electricity bills.

The scheme is being run by Essex County Council in partnership with District, Borough and City councils, and delivered by iChoosr, an independent provider which specialises in collective energy switching.

Collective energy switching works by bringing together large groups of residents who want to switch providers and pay less for their energy. Based on previous schemes, residents could save up to £133 by switching providers collectively.

Residents can register for the Essex Energy Switch by visiting www.essex.gov.uk/energyswitch between Tuesday 14 January and Monday 17 February. Residents should have a recent energy bill to hand when they register. Businesses on a domestic tariff can also register for the scheme.

On Tuesday 18 February a nationwide one-day 'energy auction' will take place, facilitated by iChoosr. This is where the major energy companies will come forward to offer the lowest energy tariff to everyone who has signed up. The more people that sign up the better the tariff is likely to be. The company offering the lowest price wins!

Once the auction has closed everyone who registered will receive a personal offer of the new tariff from iChoosr, based on their existing energy usage. Residents can then decide whether or not to accept their offer. There is absolutely no obligation to switch. Those who do decide to accept their offer will be contacted by the supplier to arrange the switch.

Residents have until Monday 17th February to sign up for the Essex Energy Switch by visiting www.essex.gov.uk/energyswitch. The website also features further advice on saving energy in the home.
